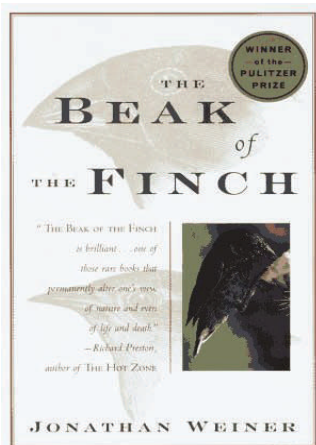

MARCH MEETING-DINNER AND DARWIN



Pulitzer Prize-winning author Jonathan Weiner will speak on his book The Beak of the Finch: A Story of Evolution in Our Time at 8:00 p.m. Weiner's book profiled the research of Peter and Rosemary Grant as they carried out extensive studies of evolution on Darwin's finches in the Galapagos Islands.

Weiner, now a science writing teacher at Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism, has also written His Brother's Keeper and Time, Love, Memory: A Great Biologist and his Quest for the Origins of Behavior.

Plans for the March meeting of the High Country Audubon Society have been made for Thursday, March 26 and include dinner plans followed by a lecture at Appalachian State University.

Anyone interested is welcome to meet at Café Portofino in Boone at 6:30 p.m. for dinner. The evening's activities will then move over to the Blue Ridge Ballroom at the Student Union on ASU's campus.

This lecture is part of ASU's Darwin Bicentennial Celebration commemorating the 200th anniversary of Darwin's birth. During the 2008-09 academic year the school has been hosting a series of lectures and events focusing on Darwin's ideas, their impacts on society, and his theory of evolution. All talks are free and open to the public.

GET TO KNOW THE WILSON CREEK IMPORTANT BIRD AREA

An IBA, or Important Bird Area, is a site that provides essential habitat for one or more species of bird. Did you know one is located right in the High Country's backyard?

The Wilson Creek IBA covers the Wilson Creek drainage at lower elevations between

HWY 181 and Edgemont Road. It was adopted in 2008 by the High Country Audubon Society.

IBAs include sites for breeding, wintering, and/or migrating birds. According to the National Audubon Society, a site must satisfy at least one of

the following criteria to qualify as an IBA. The site must support:

- Species of conservation concern (threatened and endangered species)

FUN FACTS

The American Woodcock



- Unlike many birds that leave their nests at hatching, newly hatched woodcocks cannot feed themselves. They are dependent on the mother for food for the first week. The chicks start to probe in dirt at three or four days after hatching.
- The flexible tip of the American Woodcock's bill is specialized for catching earthworms. The bird probably feels worms as it probes in the ground. A woodcock may rock its body back and forth without moving its head as it slowly walks around, stepping heavily with its front foot. This action may make worms move around in the soil, increasing their detectability.

Wilson Creek IBA cont.

- Restricted-ranges species (species vulnerable because they are not widely distributed)
- Species that are vulnerable because their populations are concentrated in one general habitat type
- Species, or groups similar species (such as waterfowl or shorebirds), that are vulnerable because they occur at high densities due to their congregatory behavior

At the moment there are 41 states with identified sites, 213 IBA adoption groups, and over 300 million acres of identified IBAs.

Two field trips to the Wilson Creek IBA

are planned Saturday, March 21 and Wednesday, March 25. During the visit the group will take a driving tour of the IBA via forest service roads in the Wilson Creek drainage. Stops will be made at some of the point count locations to do some bird watching, even though most of the summer migrants are still a month away from returning.

More information will come via e-mail the week of the trip. Those interested will carpool from Lowes Foods in Tynecastle to the IBA. A \$5 donation is requested for field trip participation. Please consider coming out and experiencing the Wilson Creek IBA firsthand!
